# **Meet the Coaches**

#### **ROB PENDERS**

#### Head Coach . Sixth Season . Wake Forest '96



Rob Penders begins his sixth season as the head coach of the St. Edward's baseball team. Last year, the Hilltoppers made a late-season push and reached the championship game of the Heartland Conference Tournament before falling to top-seeded St. Mary's.

Penders began his Hilltopper coaching career with two 40-win seasons and two Heartland Conference Championships. In 2007, he led the Hilltoppers to a 43-15 record and the school's first-ever Heartland Conference Championship. St. Edward's also qualified for the NCAA Regional Tournament for the first time in school history. For his efforts, Penders was selected as Heartland Conference Coach of the Year.

Prior to St. Edward's, Penders served as the first-base coach for University of Texas Head Coach Augie Garrido and the 2006 Longhorns squad. He had previously served on the UT coaching staff for two seasons (1999 and 2000) with the team reaching the NCAA Division I College World Series in 2000.

Between his assignments at UT, Penders spent time as an assistant at Galveston College during the 2001 season and from 2002 to 2005 at San Jacinto College. During three of his four years at San Jacinto, the team qualified for the Junior College World Series, with a third-place finish in 2002 and second-place honors in 2003 and 2004. He has coached five All-Americans, one Rhodes Scholar, one Rawlings Gold Glove Award winner and 80 players who have been drafted by professional baseball.

Penders was a four-year letterman for Wake Forest and a team captain his senior year. Primarily a third baseman, he was voted to the Atlantic Coast Conference All-Academic Team three times from 1994 to 1996. In summer 1995, he played for the Hyannis Mets in the Cape Cod League. After Wake Forest, he played professionally for the Richmond Roosters in the Frontier League in Indiana.

Baseball is in Coach Penders' blood, giving him accomplished role models. In his prep days, Penders was a two-time all-state shortstop at East Catholic High School in Manchester, Conn. He played there for his father, Jim Penders, who was the National High School Coach of the Year in 1996 and was inducted into the National High School Coaches Hall of Fame in 2008. Rob's brother, Jim, currently serves as the head baseball coach for the University of Connecticut, where both his father and his uncle, Tom Penders (long-time men's basketball coach), were members of the 1965 Huskies College World Series team.

Penders earned a bachelor's degree in communications from Wake Forest University and a master's degree in education from the University of Texas. He and his wife, Christy, have a daughter, Emily Hannah, and a son, Jack Robert. They live in Austin.

## DAVE WOOD Assistant Coach • First Season • Texas State '11



Dave Wood begins his first season as assistant coach of the St. Edward's baseball team. He will work primarily with the Hilltopper pitching staff.

Wood comes to the hilltop after spending three years in the Kansas City Royals minor league organization. In 2007, he was a member of Royals in the Arizona League where he won Player of the Year for the Royals. The 2008 season saw him split time between the Wilmington Royals and the Burlington (N.C.) Royals, where he was a team captain. His final season was played with the Class A Burlington (lowa) Royals where he helped lead them to the championship series of the Midwest League.

A native of Long Island, N.Y., Wood began his collegiate career at Stony Brook University where he was named to the Freshman All-America East Team. After transferring to Temple (Texas) College, he was named second-team all-region as both a pitcher and first baseman. His final two seasons, Wood played at Texas State where he was second-team all-conference for the 2007 Southland Conference Champion Bobcats.

Wood holds a bachelor's degree in applied arts and sciences with a coaching emphasis from Texas State.

Wood is married to the former Randi Warren and the couple lives in Kyle, Texas.

## **Season Preview**

### 2011 BASEBALL: SEASON OUTLOOK

There is a sense of optimism throughout the Hilltopper program that good things lay ahead during the upcoming season. That feeling comes from the fact that the Hilltoppers return the majority of their pitching staff and some key position players from a team that finished second in the Heartland Conference under the direction of Head Coach **Rob Penders**.

Add to that the talented group of newcomers that includes six junior college transfers and four true freshmen, and the ingredients are there for an effective offensive team that can put runs on the board.

"Returning the majority of our lineup, especially in the heart of the order, plus four starting pitchers gives us a good chance to have a successful season," Penders said. "I feel like we have the talent to win a conference championship and qualify for a regional tournament."

#### THE TEAM

#### Catcher

St. Edward's returns both catchers from last year in seniors **Colin Elmore** and **Kyle Harris**. Both players were named to the All-Heartland Conference team a year ago. Sophomore **Daniel Homann** was named to the all-conference team in 2011 and could also see time at the catching position. Redshirt freshman **Matt Schwartz** and freshman **Danny Ofield** (Bellaire HS) will provide depth at the position.

#### Infield

Adam Shank will lead an infield that returns three starters from a year ago. Shank, an all-region performer in 2011, will handle duties at first base while sophomore Taylor Johnson will be at second base, after driving in 46 runs and scoring 48 more in 2011. Junior Wes Koenig, who started 22 games at first base last season, will be a proven backup at first and will likely see significant time in the designated hitter position. Sophomore Brett Berlin also provides a big bat off of the bench. Redshirt freshmen Cutter Runte and Adam Hochandel will back up Johnson at second base. Senior Will McCaleb returns to shortstop after leading the defense with 168 assists. Sophomore Ransom LaLonde (UT—San Antonio) can play all infield positions and is a plus hitter at the plate. Junior college transfer Nate Bobrowski (San Mateo JC) has solidified himself at third base, with senior Mark Thomas as a capable backup.

#### Outfield

St. Edward's returns three letterwinners from the outfield in senior **Max Minor**, junior **Joe Pirozzolo** and sophomore **Rylan Patel**. Pirozzolo really came on down the stretch, as he broke the school record in 2011 with hits in nine-straight at-bats. The Hilltoppers have also brought in three highly touted newcomers to challenge for playing time this season. Junior transfers **Marshall Burford** (Temple JC) and **Beau Rogers** (Tacoma CC), along with freshman **AJ Hermanson** (Georgetown HS), should make for a good competition over outfield playing time.

#### THE SCHEDULE

The Hilltoppers will embark on a very challenging 50-game schedule, which includes 36 Heartland Conference games and matchups against some tough regional competition. St. Edward's will be tested by nationally ranked St. Mary's, conference mainstay UT—Permian Basin and up-and-coming Texas A&M—International University. Now-eligible Arkansas—Fort Smith, along with Newman, will also have a say in the conference race.

"St. Mary's lost a lot of players from last year's conference championship team but still is a very dangerous team," Penders said. "Now that Arkansas—Fort Smith is eligible, they will be a force to be reckoned with. TAMU—International returns as the top-hitting team in the conference and UT—Permian Basin is always really well coached. There is no clear separation in this conference in 2012, but we are looking to create that separation."

In non-conference play, St. Edward's will take on Incarnate Word, who won the Lone Star Conference title and played in the regional championship game in 2011. The Hilltoppers will also take on two other Lone Star Conference foes: Texas A&M—Kingsville and West Texas A&M in home-and-home contests. New on the schedule will be UH—Victoria, Northwood and Texas Wesleyan.

#### **Pitching**

Pitching will be a strength for the Hilltoppers this season as they return four players who were in the team's rotation within the last two season. Senior Jeff **Rohrbach** returns two years removed from a perfect 9-0 season in 2010, along with sophomore **Brad Nasis** who redshirted last season after starting eight games in 2010. Senior **Tyler Harris** returns and will move into the starting rotation full time after a handful of spot starts in 2011. Junior **Stephen Johnson** also returns and brings with him a plus fastball that will send the right-hander to the bullpen as this year's closer. Junior transfer **Kyle Seithel** (Crowder JC) is the favorite for the midweek starter, but will be pushed by senior Paul Smith, redshirt junior AJ Rataic and junior transfer Bobby Scott (Lon Morris JC). Senior Matthew Anderson and junior Max McDonald will come out of the bullpen, along with senior **Brian Shorkey** handling set-up duties. Shorkey held batters to a team-low .164 batting average in 2011. Junior transfer **Matt Davis** (Taft JC) will also see a lot of time out of the bullpen. Senior transfer Casey Russell (Oklahoma), and freshmen Bryce Davis (Harker Heights HS) and Vito Lorenzini (San Deigo, Calif./St. Augustine HS) will add additional depth to the pitching staff

#### **FINAL THOUGHTS**

A solid core of proven returning players will anchor the team and be joined by a group of dedicated freshmen and junior college transfers who have the potential to contribute immediately to the program's success. "This season I have challenged our team to be a little tougher mentally," Penders said. "We need to accept and embrace the challenges that the game presents and tackle them straight on. That is the only way to come out on top in this conference as the depth continues to improve each year."



#### **FACILITIES AND EQUIPMENT**

When you arrive at our 160-acre hilltop campus, you'll find a balance of traditional and modern architecture that speaks to the university's rich past and exemplifies our bright future. You'll also discover that campus life extends far beyond the classroom. Whether it's working out in the fitness center after a swim, grabbing a cappuccino in Jo's Coffee, or catching up with friends in an outdoor courtyard, you'll find a rich and active community at St. Edward's.

#### RECREATION AND CONVOCATION CENTER

Located in the heart of campus, the Recreation and Convocation Center is a full-featured modern facility equipped with a fitness center, a six-lane pool, four racquetball/handball courts, two full-size basketball floors and space to display all the Hilltopper trophies.

#### **LUCIAN-HAMILTON FIELD**

Built in 1968, Lucian-Hamilton Field provides an on-campus facility for the baseball team. The field is named for longtime athletics director Brother Lucian Blersch, CSC, and former baseball coach Tom Hamilton. Recently, the field has undergone improvements in the following areas: bullpen reconstruction in 2006, new dugouts in 2007, a new infield surface in 2008 and a new backstop in 2009. The field also features new enclosed batting cages with pitching mounds, to go along with a press box, concession stand and tiered seating for spectators.

#### ST. EDWARD'S UNIVERSITY ATHLETICS

St. Edward's University competes as a member of NCAA Division II in 11 sports, including baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's golf, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's tennis and volleyball. After enjoying many successful seasons in the NAIA, St. Edward's Athletics made the move to NCAA Division II in 1999. As a charter member of the Heartland Conference, the Hilltoppers have won 46 conference championships since joining the NCAA ranks. In fact, 33 of those titles have occurred since the beginning of the 2006–2007 academic year. A total of 30 Hilltoppers have earned All-America honors, 24 have been named Academic All-Americans, and St. Edward's has sent 48 teams to the NCAA National Tournament.

Hilltopper athletics is coming off another impressive year in the program's history. Four teams advanced to the NCAA National Tournament: the women's golf team finished fifth in the nation in 2011 and carries a string of six consecutive showings in the tournament; the women's soccer and men's tennis teams made runs to the Elite Eight in their sports and the men's golf team advanced to the Regional Tournament. Volleyball won the conference title for the third year in a row and women's tennis went into conference tournament play as the number one seed.

Hilltopper student-athletes have enjoyed success in the classroom too, earning a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher for the past 17 semesters. This past spring, 127 student-athletes compiled a 3.0 GPA or higher and 16 individuals earned a 4.0 GPA.


