INTERVIEW REQUESTS

TCU generally holds practices during the week between 2:30 and 5:30 p.m. All media wishing to cover practice or interview a TCU player or coach before or after practice should contact Brandie Davidson before noon of the day they wish to conduct the interview to confirm the availability of the player or coach they wish to interview.

MEDIA CREDENTIALS

Requests for official working media credentials should be directed to Brandie Davidson. Requests should be made in writing at least one business day prior to the game. Season credentials will be mailed prior to the first game. If time does not allow for credentials to be mailed, they may be picked up with proper identification at the Lupton Stadium ticket booth on game day.

SCOUT PASSES

Professional scouts may obtain credentials through the TCU Athletics Media Relations office. Due to limited seating in the press box, scouts will be directed to the general seating area of Lupton Stadium, but are welcome to bring materials such as updated statistics and an official scorecard. Scouts are asked to be aware of game patrons and respect their desires to watch the game.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Due to limited space on the field and in the seating areas of Lupton Stadium, all photographers must see Brandie Davidson prior to shooting at TCU home games to obtain rules and regulations.

RADIO BROADCASTS

Lupton Stadium is equipped with two separate radio broadcasting booths. The TCU radio booth is located on first base side while the visiting radio booth is on the third base side. PRESSBOX SERVICES

Game notes, an official scorecard, complete team and individual statistics and box scores are provided to working media by the TCU Athletics Media Relations offices at every TCU home game. Given proper notice, the Media Relations office will offer faxing services to all interested media. For any other requests, please contact Brandie Davidson.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

Following a brief cooling-off period, media may accompany Brandie Davidson to lower level Lupton Stadium for postgame interviews with TCU coaches and players. Interviews will take place in the assistant coaches offices. The TCU clubhouse is always off limits to the media. Radio wishing to interview coaches and players after the game will be able to plug in a field mike behind home plate to get a live feed from the field. Jim Schlossnagle will be available after all games along with selected players.

TCU BASEBALL ON THE RADIO



For the ninth consecutive season, TCU fans can catch all the excitement of Horned Frog baseball on KTCU 88.7 FM. The broadcasts can also be heard around the world by logging onto **www.gofrogs.com**. All games are broadcast live with the pregame show beginning 15 minutes before first pitch.

Calling all the action for the Frogs is Chuck LaMendola. The 2005 campaign marks LaMendola's ninth season behind the microphone as the voice of Horned Frog baseball. Fans can also join Chuck and head coach Jim Schlossnagle on Monday evenings for their weekly show beginning at 6:30 p.m. Chuck and Coach Schlossnagle will answer questions they receive via e-mails throughout the week.

As a full time faculty member in TCU's Radio-Television-Film department, LaMendola teaches television and film production as well as classes in the new sports broadcasting area within the department. His Remote Sports Broadcasting class is responsible for the images on the video board during Horned Frog football games in Amon G. Carter Stadium.

LaMendola's play-by-play broadcast of TCU baseball has been honored twice with a National Award of Distinction with the 2002 and 2004 Communicator Award.

Chuck and his wife, Kelly, have two daughters, Francesca, 12, and Juliana, 8. The LaMendola's reside in Burleson.

LUPTON STADIUM & WILLIAMS-REILLY FIELD



The 2003 season marked the beginning of a new era in TCU baseball with the opening of the Charlie and Marie Lupton Baseball Stadium and Williams-Reilly Field. The stadium officially opened its doors Feb. 2, 2003 when the Horned Frogs dropped a 5-3 decision to long-time Metroplex rival Texas-Arlington. A crowd of 3,105, the largest crowd ever see a baseball game on the TCU campus, was on hand for the inaugural game. The stadium was officially dedicated prior to the Frogs' 5-2 loss to Houston March 28.

The Horned Frogs enjoyed a successful first season in the friendly confines of Lupton Stadium as they compiled a 21-9 home record. The fans also enjoyed taking in a ballgame at the new stadium as over 38,000 fans came out to the ballpark in its first season, ranking 34th in the country in attendance. TCU is averaging 1,307 fans per game in its first two seasons at Lupton Stadium.

The state-of-the-art ballpark is located on the TCU campus, between the Bayard H. Friedman Tennis Center to the north, the Lowden Track to the west and the Garvey-Rosenthal Soccer Stadium to the east.

Ground was broken for Lupton Stadium Oct. 18, 2001 and construction officially began Dec. 3, 2001. The \$7 million ballpark stands as one of the premier facilities in all of college baseball.

The ballpark is named for Charlie and Marie Lupton in recognition of a \$2 million gift from the Brown-Lupton Foundation.

The foundation was founded in 1944 by business partners T.J. "Tom" Brown and Charles A. Lupton, both deceased. The business leaders owned the Fort Worth Coca-Cola Bottling franchise and other bottling plants in Texas and California. Lupton Stadium is not the first project at TCU that the Brown-Lupton Foundation has helped make a reality, as the foundation has also contributed naming rights to the Brown-Wright Residential Community, the Brown-Lupton Student Center and the Brown-Lupton Health Center. Additionally, the foundation has donated to the construction of Tandy Hall and the Walsh Center for Performing Arts and to the expansion of the Mary Coats Burnett Library, as well as providing significant support for TCU athletics, research, scholarships and other University needs. In all, the Brown-Lupton Foundation has donated more than \$11.5 million to TCU over the last three decades.

The playing surface is named Williams-Reilly Field in honor of former TCU baseball letterman and coach Roger Williams and business leader Michael Reilly. Williams,

who lettered in baseball at TCU from 1967-71 and served as the Horned Frogs' head coach in 1976, is currently a member of the TCU Board of Trustees and served as chairman of the Lupton Stadium Capital Campaign. The owner of Roger Williams Chrysler-Dodge-Jeep in Weatherford, Williams has been a strong supporter of Horned Frog athletics throughout the years through both financial contributions and dedication of time. He was recently named the state of Texas' ??????

Michael Reilly is a commercial real estate developer in the Metroplex. He has been a strong philanthropist in the DFW community for many years, supporting a number of area initiatives. Reilly served as a minority owner of the Texas Rangers Baseball Club from 1974-98. Williams and Reilly have been lifelong friends and were high school teammates at Arlington Heights High School in Fort Worth.

In all, more than 220 donors contributed to the construction of Lupton Stadium and Williams-Reilly Field.

"The construction of this stadium was the culmination of a lot of hard work put by a number of people," TCU Athletics Director Eric Hyman said. "We are extremely grateful for the efforts of (former) Chancellor Michael Ferrari, Roger Williams and the board members who pushed hard to get us to this point with this project."

The facility features 2,500 seats, giving the Frogs one of the five largest ballparks in Conference USA. However, the unique two-deck structure allows for every seat to be extremely close to the playing surface and to have a great vantage point of all the exciting action on the field. A cantilevered roof system covers part of the stadium grandstand, protecting fans from the sun and rain. Seats range from lower-deck chairback seats to upper-level club seats, as well as general admission bleacher seating. Additionally, the ballpark features easy access to ticket booths, concession areas and restrooms right on the main concourse. Lupton Stadium also features three luxury suites, providing a spectacular view of Horned Frog baseball.

For the players and coaches, Lupton Stadium features locker rooms for home and visiting teams, as well as a dressing area for umpires. The spacious home clubhouse features 35 custom-built lockers for the Horned Frogs. Located under the main grandstand, the TCU clubhouse provides direct access to the Frogs' third base dugout.

Also adjacent to the TCU clubhouse are the assistant coaches offices and dressing areas for the Horned Frog coaching staff, a spacious athletic training room, laundry and equipment facilities, as well as indoor batting cages, available for year-round use.

Local, regional, and national media will also have the privilege of covering games at Lupton Stadium from one of the finest press facilities in college baseball. The Garry Williams press box

has ample seating for working media and is named in honor of Williams, a longtime supporter of TCU baseball. Home and visitor radio broadcasters will enjoy separate spacious booths to call the games as well.

The playing surface features the latest technology in field maintenance, including a Bermuda TIFF 419 surface. The dugouts are heated with Major League-style bat and helmet racks and spacious bullpen areas are located outside the field of play.

The scoreboard, foul poles and flag poles, donated by Garry Williams to the old TCU Diamond, have been moved to Lupton Stadium and add familiar features from the old ballpark for long-time Horned Frog faithful. The main entrance to the stadium even includes some of the bricks that made up the Wrigley Field-style backstop at the old TCU Diamond.

"Lupton Stadium and Williams-Reilly Field is one of the premier facilities in all of college baseball," said head coach Jim Schlossnagle. "Without question, it is what first attracted me to TCU and has made the same impact on many outstanding high school and junior college players. Facilities represent commitment and everyone, nationwide, now realizes that TCU is committed

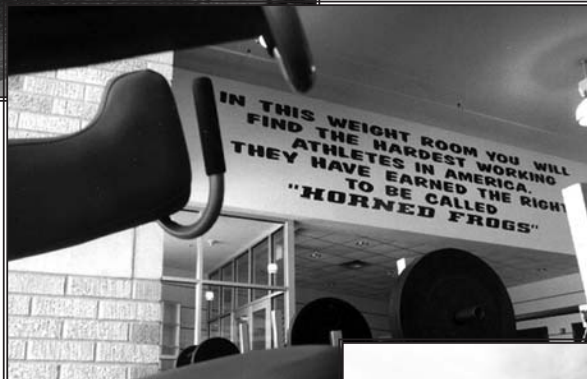

WALSH COMPLEX

TCU's spacious Walsh Complex, located on the north side of Daniel Meyer Coliseum, provides student-athletes with a state-of-the-art facility for athletic training and rehabilitation as well as weight training and conditioning.

In the all-sport weight room, the Horned Frog baseball squad is strengthened under the tutelage of three full-time weight coaches. Having such streamlined direction and individual attention in the weight room maximizes the team's time and effort in the facility.

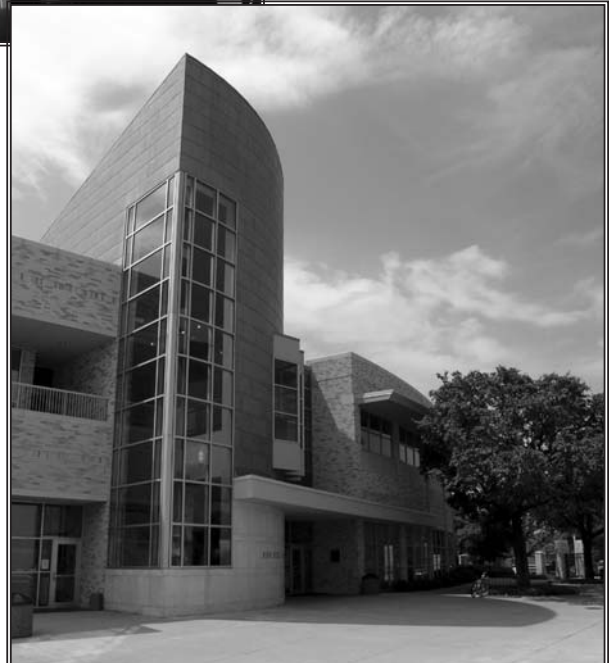

Full-time trainers, team physicians and student trainers work together to prevent injury and oversee successful recovery and rehabilitation efforts. The vast resources available at the Walsh Complex aid in that purpose.



JOHN JUSTIN CENTER

The 38,000-square-foot John Justin Athletic Center, which was completed in August 2000, houses the academic center, administrative offices, compliance offices, video center, the Heritage center and the football offices. The center was named after longtime TCU trustee John Justin, former CEO of Justin Industries.

The resources of the Justin Center's academic center, including TCU's staff of athletic academic advisors, have been instrumental in the success of the Horned Frogs in the classroom. The academic center includes individual tutor rooms, group study rooms and a computer lab, all near the student-athletes' workout and competitive venues.

2005 TCU BASEBALL PREVIEW

In 2004, the **Jim Schlossnagle** era began with a bang: the Frogs won a school-record 39 games, a conference championship and earned a berth in the NCAA Regionals for the first time in 10 years. The Frogs have a new challenge in 2005 -- living up to expectations. This year's squad features the third-ranked recruiting class in the nation and enters the season ranked No. 21 in the country by *Baseball America*.

The winning attitude can be seen from the coaching staff to the highly-touted recruiting class that will make its debut this spring. The class brought in by recruiting coordinator **Todd Whitting** features three four-year transfers, five junior college transfers and 13 freshmen. The addition of volunteer assistant **Derek Matlock** to the coaching staff along with **Matt Siegel** and **Mike Dilley** keeps with the winning tradition that is being established by Coach Schlossnagle and staff.

The Horned Frogs look to string together a fifth-consecutive season of 30-plus wins in 2005. Several factors play to the Horned Frogs' advantage: TCU returns six starters in the field and six pitchers that saw significant time on the mound, while TCU's dominance at Lupton Stadium (41 wins, 18 losses) will be exploited in this year's 31 home contests.

The Frogs hope to go out on top in their final season as members of Conference USA. TCU has enjoyed a great deal of success in the league, finishing in the top four in each of its three seasons in C-USA. The home portion of the Frogs' schedule features some of the upper-echelon teams in Conference USA. NCAA tournament participants Southern Miss and East Carolina come to Lupton as well as in-state rival Houston.

"Conference USA has certainly become one of the top leagues in all of college baseball," said Schlossnagle. "It has

both great quality across the board and depth. Our fans should be excited about being able to see Houston, East Carolina, USF, Louisville and Southern Miss visit Lupton Stadium this spring. The league should, again, send four or five teams to the NCAA Tournament."

Also on the docket this season are two home games against Texas Tech and home-and-home series with Baylor, Oklahoma and UT-Arlington. TCU will also get a look at future competition from the Mountain West as it opens the season with Utah. The Frogs' road schedule will prove just as challenging as they take on NCAA tournament teams Florida Atlantic, Rice and Tulane. The Frogs will play 19 games against teams that qualified for Regionals and six games against teams that made it to a Super Regional.

"Our schedule this year is both balanced and challenging," remarked Schlossnagle. "If we can have success versus this schedule, we will be in a position to be an NCAA Tournament team again. The early season trips to Florida Atlantic and Rice will be a great test against

perennially strong NCAA tournament teams. Unlike last season, we get to host some of the historically strong teams in C-USA and that should provide some exciting baseball in Lupton Stadium."

With the experience returning in the field and on the mound, the new faces will only improve a team that finished fourth in C-USA last season, made an improbable run to the tournament championship and placed third at the NCAA Austin Regional.

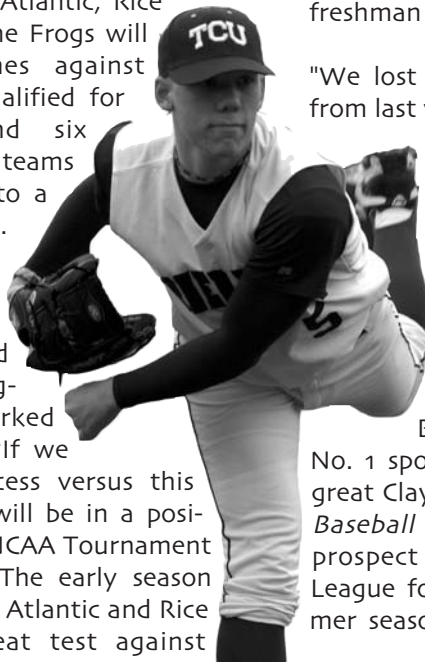
"Last season was a great year for the program and university," commented Schlossnagle. "We are significantly better in terms of ability at almost every position due to either recruiting or improvement in our returning players."

Starting Pitching

Graduation decimated the Frogs starting pitching staff, but with the addition of two four-year transfers, some capable freshmen and a core of returners, the starting rotation could be one of the best in the league. Emerging as the headliners for the Frogs' rotation this season are Dallas Baptist transfer **Lance Broadway**, Nebraska transfer **Brad Furnish** and heavily recruited freshman **Sam Demel**.

"We lost an awful lot of experience from last year's pitching staff and that is hard to replace," remarked Schlossnagle. "However, we brought in and return some very talented pitchers. If we can stay healthy, I really like both the quality and depth of our pitching staff."

Broadway is primed to fill the No. 1 spot vacated by Horned Frog great Clayton Jerome. Broadway was *Baseball America's* No. 1 draft prospect out of the Northwood League following a dominating summer season. He is coming off a 10-

campaign with the Patriots in 2004 in which he fanned 102 batters in 108.2 innings pitched. Left-handed pitcher Furnish returns to his native-Texas after a season with the Nebraska Cornhuskers in which he was 3-0 in 16 appearances. He can hit over 90 on the radar gun and boasts an excellent breaking ball. Demel is a hard-throwing right-hander who has a dominating repertoire of pitches.

With the depth on the roster in 2005, the Frogs have multiple options to choose from for a mid-week starter. **Chad Underwood** showed signs of being a reliable starter and a healthy **Tim McGough** could also step into the role of a starter. The freshman class could benefit the most in the role of mid-week starter with Seattle Mariner draft-pick **Zach Ashwood** and right-hander **Jake Friemel** making a strong push for a starting role.

"Certainly, I expect Lance Broadway, Sam Demel, Brad Furnish, Zach Ashwood and Tim McGough to compete for spots in the rotation," said Schlossnagle. "However, there are several other pitchers, including **Tyler Kersten** and **Omar Arif**, who have performed well and will push for mound time. Chad Underwood is likely our most valuable pitcher. He is a strike-thrower who can pitch and succeed in any role."

The Bullpen

The bullpen looks to be improved greatly this season with 17 pitchers including seven left-handers on the roster. The mix of freshmen and transfers gives the coaching staff a lot of options for situational pitching as well as middle-inning relief and spot starts.

"We have a variety of guys to choose from to make up our bullpen," said Schlossnagle. "In order to succeed at the highest level, we will look

to several different pitchers to pitch in a host of roles."

Chris White looks to retain his role as a situational lefty. **Chase Perry** had a breakout season and should see significant time in 2005. Transfer **Shawn Ferguson** is expected to fill the closer role that was vacated by Robbie Findlay's graduation.

"We recruited Shawn Ferguson to pitch in a closing role for us and he certainly has that ability," remarked Schlossnagle. "If he can remain durable throughout the season, we expect great things from him. Chad Underwood, Chase Perry, Jake Friemel and Tim McGough could also pitch in relief roles, along with Bo Cogbill."

The Infield

The Frogs return two talented players on the infield this season and got a boost with a Houston transfer, senior **Stuart Musslewhite**. The addition of capable freshmen make the task of filling the two vacancies a little easier.

"We will really miss **Ramon Moses** and **Chris Neuman** from last year but not too many teams in the country return the quality of infielders that we do in **Bo Cogbill** and **Shelby Ford**," said Schlossnagle. "Stuart Musslewhite can play either of the middle infield positions and has had success and experience at a very high level."

After making the transition to third base late last season, senior **Bo Cogbill** will be the guy at the hot corner again this season. His ability to hit for

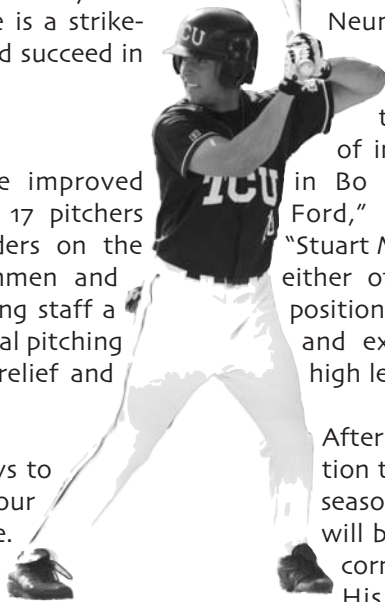
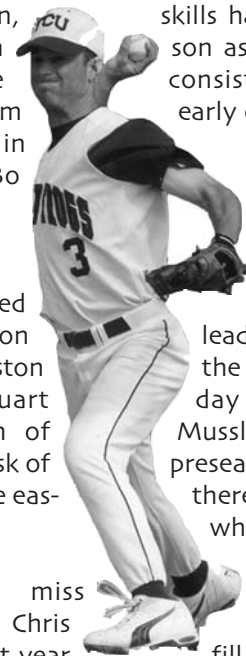
average and get on base will keep him in the lineup. Also pushing for time at third base is freshman **Matt Carpenter**. Carpenter has a good bat that has shown it needs to be in the lineup. His defensive play at third base has also caught the staff's eye early on.

Preseason all-American and all-conference player **Shelby Ford** made the transition to short during the Frogs' playoff run and performed well in that role. He was the Frogs' leading home run threat last season with 16 long balls and with a year under his belt at the collegiate level, should be a key player for the Frogs. His defensive skills have improved in the offseason as he's been one of the most consistent defensive performers early on.

While the Frogs' starting shortstop returns, graduation has left a big void at second base with the departure of emotional leader, **Ramon Moses**. Ford was the early pick to be the opening day starter at shortstop, but **Musslewhite** is having a strong preseason and could see some time there this season. Regardless of who wins the job at short, both bats will be in the lineup. Whoever doesn't play short is the leading candidate to fill the void at second.

Musslewhite was a great pickup for the Frogs in terms of his leadership abilities and his postseason experience. He has three years of collegiate experience under his belt as the starting shortstop for the Cougars, who reached the Super Regionals in two of his three seasons.

Walk-on transfer **Justin Roland** impressed the coaching staff in the fall with his outstanding defensive skills and could see significant playing time in the middle infield. Also taking reps is Fort Worth native, freshman **John Dao**.

"Justin Roland may be our best defensive infielder and has been a great surprise heading into the spring," raved Schlossnagle.

Chris Neuman's graduation leaves first base wide open. Freshmen **Matt Carpenter** and **Spencer Jackson** could split time there, while pre-season all-American **Chad Huffman** could also see some time at first this season when he's not in the outfield. With Jackson being a right hander and Carpenter batting from the left side, the versatility

allows the coaching staff to match-up with the opposition.

"Chad Huffman, Matt Carpenter and Spencer Jackson will play a role at the corner infield positions and DH," said Schlossnagle. "For our team to be able to achieve its goals, we will have to continually improve our defensive play in the infield."

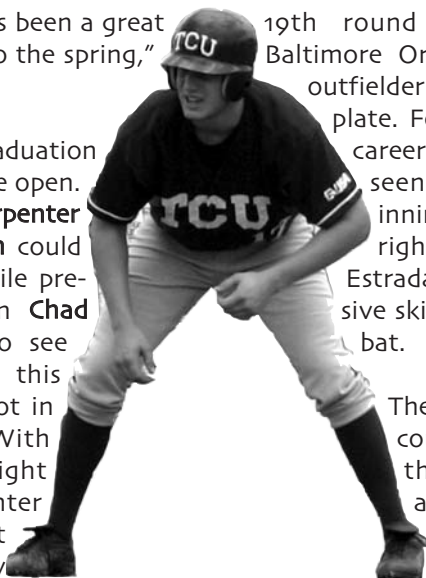
The Outfield

The outfield has the strongest returning depth in 2005 and with the addition of five talented outfielders, each spot is open to whoever is hottest come opening day.

The Frogs trio of Huffman, **Austin Adams** and **J.J. Estrada** return following an outstanding run in the postseason, but waiting in the wings are Jerid Buttell, Keith Conlon, Chase Kiecke, Matt McGuirk and Ryan Pack.

"There are several players who could play in our outfield at any given time," remarked Schlossnagle. "Our depth in the outfield will give us the ability to play the hot hand and match up with the opposing team."

The Frogs leading hitter in 2004, Chad Huffman returns as the leading candidate to play left field, a position he played 28 times last season. Huffman led the squad with a .383 average and 68 runs scored. Pushing him is fresh-



man **Matt McGuirk**. McGuirk was a 19th round draft pick by the Baltimore Orioles. He is a speedy outfielder with a good eye at the plate. For the first time in his career at TCU, J.J. Estrada has seen some preseason innings in left. The Frogs' right fielder a year ago, Estrada has excellent defensive skills and some pop in his bat.

The center field position could see some changes this season with the addition of junior college transfer, **Ryan Pack**. Pack's speed and ability to get a good jump on the ball have him penciled in as the early favorite to patrol the spacious center field of Lupton Stadium.

Austin Adams returns for his sophomore season following a breakout freshman campaign. He was one of the Frogs most versatile athletes in the outfield in 2004, splitting time between center and right field. While pushing for the starting spot in center, Adams looks to be making the transition to right field in 2005. After having one of the hottest bats to close out the '04 campaign, Adams should get considerable playing time in 2005.

Adams has competition for the right field spot with the emergence of **Keith Conlon** this spring. Conlon has been swinging a hot bat in practice and playing a good defensive right field. Estrada is also battling hard to retain his starting spot in right. His defensive skills will get him some at-bats at various spots in the outfield.

"This is the area of our team, along with our pitching staff, that we are greatly improved in terms of ability and depth," remarked Schlossnagle. "Austin Adams had a great season last year and certainly should only be bet-

ter. Chad Huffman is an outstanding hitter and can play the outfield. Matt McGuirk did really well in the fall and brings a lot of athletic ability to our lineup. Ryan Pack is an outstanding defensive player, covers a lot of ground and has a strong throwing arm."

The Catchers

Kyle Dahlberg returns for his senior season behind the plate. Dahlberg appeared in all but one game for the Frogs in 2004 and looks to be the starter again this season, with freshman **Andrew Walker** getting some playing time as well. Walker is a good hitter and is progressing defensively. As one of the best defensive catchers in the league, Dahlberg will be counted on to bring Walker along this season.

"We have a great situation behind the plate in that we return an experienced, successful defensive catcher in Kyle Dahlberg," raved Schlossnagle. "Kyle can really catch and throw and has earned the confidence of the pitching staff. Andrew Walker has great ability especially at the plate and has made great improvements in his defensive game this fall. I expect both to play significantly and work together to make that a strong area of our team."

If the Frogs live up to expectations the 2005 season could be one of the best-ever in the history of the program.

"The key to our season, like every team, will come down to how well we develop and succeed on the mound and defensively," commented Schlossnagle. "I believe we have a very potent offensive team and that should remain relatively consistent over the season. However, because of the schedule we are playing and the league we are in, our pitchers are going to have to develop experience quickly so that we can reach our postseason goals."
